Volunteers help our organization in many different ways! Our most valued volunteers are the individuals who come out to assist our riders & instructors in the riding program from June to August. They each spend a few hours on a Tuesday or Thursday night. They groom the horses, organize the tack and tack up each horse, arrange the riding helmets so they are easily accessed by the instructors for each rider, and assist with mounting the rider. Each rider can need as many as 3-4 volunteers to assist them during the 30 min riding session: a horse leader (the person in control of the horse) and a side-walker on either side of the rider. Side walkers can offer emotional support to riders, or light physical support to help the rider get the most out of each session. We have side walkers who sing in harmony for the riders who really enjoy hearing the music. Singing can also calm and relax the riders.

We also need to acknowledge the dedicated team of people who make up our Board of Directors! The have devoted time and energy to keep our organization on track to make the absolutely best experience for our riders. Angie Muir, our dedicated Chairperson, has guided PARD for many years and she relies on board members to carry out the many tasks to fundraise, organize & support the riding program. Our current board members have actually been serving an extended term due to the Covid-19 pandemic. All members of the PARD board are volunteers who meet monthly, in person and now

virtually, in order to keep our organization running from year to year. A BIG thank you to all of you!!

We would not be able to operate our riding program without the assistance of Wendon Hills Equestrian Centre. This is where our five horses and outdoor riding ring are located. Wendon Hills provides the care for our horses year-round and they have always gone above and beyond the expectations of a boarding arrangement. Volunteers Needed!

In an ideal world:

Volunteers are needed for a few hours a week to assist with the PARD riding program. Horse experience is not necessary. The program runs from June through August in the Warsaw area, about 15 mins North of Peterborough (detailed directions are on our website). Assisted lessons, on Tuesday and Thursday, are scheduled at 6:00, 6:30, 7:00, and 7:30. Each lesson runs approximately 30 minutes in length, with 1-4 riders in each lesson. Each rider requires 1-5 volunteers to safely assist them during their ride. There is a leader who is responsible for the horse, and often side-walkers who support the rider in a variety of different ways. More details are covered during the annual Open House and in the volunteer manual which each volunteer receives. Specific directions, based on the needs of each rider, will be given by the Instructor during the lesson. Typically, volunteers arrive around 5:30 to assist with preparing for lessons and stay until the horses are untacked and turned out. However, we understand this doesn't work for everyone and appreciate whatever time you can give!

Due to Covid-19, as of the creation date of our Spring Newsletter, our riding season for 2020 is currently on hold until we receive more direction from health authorities. As a result, this year our Work Day, Open House and lesson program start dates have not been determined. If you are interested in volunteering with us this year please contact us. We currently have a need for more board members and individuals to help with fundraising so we can keep our program running through these stressful times.


Horse **Sponsorship** Thank you



It Took A Village

PARD would like to express a heartfelt thanks to the owners and staff at Linwood Homes who made PARD's dreams come true by finishing two outbuildings at the facility. In 2013 PARD left their former home in Keene and moved to the current location just outside the village of Warsaw in the township of Douro-Dummer. The hay field was excavated by Edwards Sand & Gravel and a meager sandring and driveway created just in time for the start of the riding season. The former buildings from the Keene site were deconstructed and the materials saved for reuse. The new buildings were designed to be bigger, accessible and barrier free. Bob Hynes from Your Own Design worked with PARD to draw up blueprints for two buildings, one affectionately referred to as 'the office' although it's actually so much more, and the other to house tack and equipment. The buildings are seated on concrete pads with an accessibility ramp along the front of the tack building giving riders easier access to the ring. The cost of the concrete was

paid for by a grant PARD received in 2014 from Peterborough Foundation and the work was completed by Castle Ridge Concrete. When it was time to construct the buildings, Peterborough Truss generously donated the trusses and then Craig and his team from Linwood Homes got to work constructing the two beautiful buildings you see at the facility now. Linwood Homes donated their time and materials to finish the buildings for which PARD is very

grateful. And a thank you to Alf Curtis Home Improvements who have long supported the PARD organization and their endeavours. In fact, PARD is at a loss for words when it comes to thanking all the businesses, individuals and community community groups who donated their time, materials and financial support.


